

## CHA Consulting Inc. SHORT FORM AGREEMENT



THIS AGREEMENT is made this \_\_\_\_\_ day of April, 2015 by and between CHA Consulting, Inc. (hereinafter "CHA") and Town of Aurora (hereinafter "Client"). Client and CHA, for the consideration hereinafter set forth, hereby agree as follows:

#### 1. Services of CHA

CHA agrees to provide the professional services described in Exhibit A (hereinafter the "Services") attached and incorporated by reference.

#### 2. Schedule of Services

CHA shall use its best efforts to complete the Services in a timely fashion to meet Client's requirements. If the parties have agreed to a specific project schedule and specific milestone dates, such information will be set forth in Exhibit B attached hereto.

#### 3. Responsibilities of Client

Client shall furnish or make available to CHA any and all of its records, maps, or other data which are pertinent to CHA's work. Client shall authorize and assist CHA in obtaining any such pertinent information from other public and private sources. The parties agree to use their best efforts to resolve the dispute within thirty (30) days of Client's notice to CHA. Client's failure to dispute an invoice within fourteen (14) days of the invoice date shall be deemed a waiver of all claims pertaining to that invoice.

#### 5. <u>Termination</u>

This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon not less than seven (7) days written notice. CHA shall be compensated for all Services performed until the receipt of notice plus any fees and/or costs reasonably necessary to properly terminate the project.

#### 6. Relationship of Parties

In no event shall the indemnification obligation extend beyond the date when the institution of legal or equitable proceedings for professional negligence would be barred by any applicable statute of repose or statute of limitations.

Client shall indemnify and hold harmless CHA, its officers, directors, shareholders, partners, agents and employees from and against those damages and costs (including reasonable attorney's fees) that CHA is legally obligated to pay as a result of a third party claim concerning the death or bodily injury to any person or the destruction or damage to any property, but only to the extent caused by the negligent act, error or omission of Client subject to any limitations of liability contained in this Agreement.

#### 11. Limitation on Liability

The total liability of CHA and its officers, directors, shareholders, partners, employees and agents to Client and any one claiming by, through or under Client for any and all injuries, claims, losses, expenses or damages whatsoever arising out of, or in any way related to, the Services of this Agreement from any cause or causes whatsoever including, but not limited to, negligence, errors, omissions, strict liability or breach of contract shall not exceed the total compensation received by CHA under this Agreement or the total amount of \$1,000,000, whichever is greater.

#### 12. No Personal Liability

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement to the contrary, CHA's officers, directors, shareholders, partners, employees, or agents shall not be personally liable, regardless of the cause of action asserted including breach of contract, warranty, guarantee, products liability, negligence, tort, strict liability, or any other cause pertaining to CHA's performance or non-performance of the Agreement. Client will look solely to CHA for its remedy for any claim arising out of or related to this Agreement

#### 13. Waiver of Consequential Damages

In no event shall CHA be liable to Client or the Client to CHA for consequential, special or indirect damages, including but not limited to, loss of profits or revenue, loss of use of equipment, loss of production, additional expenses incurred in the use of the equipment and facilities and claims of customers of the Client. This disclaimer shall apply to consequential damages based upon any cause of action whatsoever asserted including, but not limited to, ones arising out of any breach of contract, warranty, guarantee, products liability, negligence,

tort, strict liability, or any other cause arising out of the performance or non-performance of the contract by Client/CHA.

#### 14. Mediation

As a follow-up to our January 12, 2015 letter, we have completed our traffic engineering investigation related to your December 23, 2014 request for a reduced speed limit on Hubbard Road in the Town of Aurora.

The need for a reduced speed limit is based on a thorough evaluation of many factors, including roadway characteristics and roadside development. The majority of motorists drive at a speed which they perceive to be reasonable and prudent for existing conditions. Experience has shown that if there is no apparent reason for driving at a reduced speed, the posting of signs with an arbitrarily lower speed limit does not result in voluntary compliance by the majority of drivers. Thus, the lower speed limit results in larger speed differentials which can make the road less safe.

Based on our evaluation of Hubbard Road, between Center Street and Sweet Road, we have determined that 45 MPH is the appropriate speed limit and will not be reduced at this time.
